**Donald A. Bailey** after earning an Hons. BA from the University of Saskatchewan read Modern History at Oxford University and then earned a PhD from the University of Minnesota. Now retired, he taught Early Modern European History for thirty-six years at the University of Winnipeg, branching out to teach the History of Women over 2500 years and of Political Thought from Machiavelli to Wollstonecraft.
