Graham Murphy was minister at Ullet Road Church, Liverpool and Principal of the Unitarian College, Manchester. While in Dallas, he received the Carl Brannin Humanitarian Award from the First Unitarian Church for his work with refugees and advocacy for patients with AIDS. He now practices medicine in the specialty of infectious diseases in Reno, where he is Clinical Professor of Medicine at the University of Nevada, Reno.

Bob Janis-Dillon serves as Congregational Connections Lead at the UK General Assembly of Unitarian & Free Christian Churches. A Unitarian minister for fifteen years, he was educated at the University of Birmingham (UK), Meadville Lombard Theological School (Chicago), and Moravian Theological School (Pennsylvania).
